Sharing Your Story

The Arc's Parent Coalition was pleased to host our annual Legislative Coffee on December 10th. This was a wonderful opportunity for families to share stories with their elected officials. Our thanks to Representative Vincent Buys, Representative Luanne Van Werven (standing at right), Thomas Boucher (Community Liason for U.S. Congressman Rick Larsen), Karlee Deatherage (Congressional Outreach Coordinator for U.S. Congresswoman Suzan DelBene), and Joe Downs (Northwest Washington Outreach Director for U.S. Senator Maria Cantwell) who attended the event.



Communication with your elected officials is important. All of the elected officials and staff in attendance stressed the importance of sharing your personal story. Stories help officials understand the impact of legislation for real people. Stories can also be a valuable tool for legislators to use on the floor when debating a piece of legislation. But before you write, email or call, think about the message you want to send. Consider following these four basic suggestions:

- **IDENTIFY** yourself by name and the town from which you are calling or writing.
- **EXPLAIN** why you are contacting your representative: "I am calling/writing to support/oppose House Bill: HB_____, Senate Bill: SB_____." Be polite and concise in your explanation. Ask your legislator what their opinion is on the issue, and do not assume that they have prior knowledge of your issue.
- **REQUEST** a written response to your contact.
- **THANK** the person who took your call or your legislator for their time and consideration.

ABLE Act Becomes Law

The Achieving a Better Life Experience (ABLE) Act, now known as the Stephen Beck Jr. ABLE Act, was passed by Congress and signed into law by President Obama in December. The ABLE Act allows for tax advantaged savings accounts for individuals with disabilities, without jeopardizing certain important federal benefits such as SSI and Medicaid. The funds saved in these accounts, if managed correctly, can be another tool in planning for the lifetime support needs of an individual with disabilities.

- People with disabilities or family members can put up to \$14,000 per year in the account and up to \$100,000 total.
- The funds must be spent on qualified expenses related to the individual's disability, such as health, education, housing, transportation, training, assistive technology, personal support, and related services and expenses.
- Individuals with significant disabilities with age of onset before 26 years of age qualify.
- States would be able to recoup some expenses through Medicaid upon the death of the beneficiary.
- The Secretary of the Department of Treasury will begin to develop regulations that will guide the states in terms of a) the information required to be presented to open an ABLE account; b) the documentation needed to meet the requirements of ABLE account eligibility for a person with a disability; and c) the definition details of "qualified disability expenses" and the documentation that will be needed for tax reporting. No accounts can be established until the regulations are finalized. States will begin to accept applications to establish ABLE accounts before the end of 2015.
- The cost of establishing an ABLE account will be considerably less than a Special Needs Trust and will provide more choice and control for the beneficiary and family. With an ABLE account, account owners will have the ability to control their funds and, if circumstances change, still have other options available to them. Determining which option is the most appropriate will depend upon individual circumstances. For many families, the ABLE account will be a significant and viable option in addition to, rather than instead of, a Trust program.


movies, community festivals, and more) and to discuss important issues in their lives.

MEET TERRI HANSEN, INCLUSION ADVOCATE AT THE ARC

Terri Hansen has been working for The Arc as our Assistant Inclusion Advocate for almost 14 years. Prior to being an employee of The Arc, Terri was a volunteer through the Community Transitions program of Bellingham Schools. Terri's job consists of communicating and making connections with individuals in Whatcom County through various advocacy groups. Terri shares her knowledge and experience as well as her talents, by giving presentations on inclusion, respectful language, reasonable accommodations and person-centered planning.

Terri says that working at The Arc and meeting with people in the community has taught her a lot about different ways to advocate for the rights of individuals with disabilities. Terri sees how individuals possess equal choice in their life. "The challenge of this job is keeping up with all the paperwork. My goal is to keep inspiring the audiences that I come in contact with," Terri says.

Terri has seen little and big changes in legislation and society through her involvement. She provides and models respectful support, helping individuals make desired changes and gain independence as well as helping their families find the right resources to better their everyday lives. Terri strives for a community where individuals with disabilities have the right to make their own choices and decisions in how they want to successfully run their lives.

Opening Doors to Hospitality

Terri is working to have a local impact in the hospitality industry in how travelers with disabilities are served by hotels and restaurants. People with disabilities, in the United States and around the world, travel for both business and pleasure and regularly use hotels. This market represents over 18% of the population. According to a 2002 study by the Open Doors Organization (ODO), a Chicago non-profit, annual spending by travelers with disabilities equals \$13.6 billion.

The hospitality industry prides itself on giving its customers a warm welcome and providing outstanding service in pursuit of high guest retention and consumer satisfaction. By extending that same level of customer service to guests who have disabilities, hotels and lodging establishments can build a clientele in a growing, diverse market that remains, as yet, nearly untapped. People with disabilities and older adults who benefit from accessible features are likely to become repeat customers for businesses that provide them with accurate information, informed assistance, and a friendly attitude.

Hospitality is not provided when a guest cannot get to the front door, register at the front desk, eat in the restaurant, or maneuver around his room. Good customer service practices that assist people with disabilities will bring repeat business from guests with disabilities, older travelers, and friends and families that accompany this large and growing market.


Meet Kayla Day: Inspirational Speaker & Advocate for Inclusion
