Dear friends,

In 2018, The Arc of Whatcom County made remarkable strides toward fulling our goal: to ensure that people with developmental disabilities enjoy full participation and equitable rights in their community. Alongside our membership and our supporters, we've provided individuals with developmental disabilities and their families with information, education, and training. Staff and volunteers have worked to link individuals and families to natural supports, assist with accessing programs and services, education and train for community impact, develop leadership, provide information and resources, as well as offer networking opportunities in all life areas, birth through the lifespan.

As we wrap up 2018 over 2,400 community members received our monthly newsletter with information on relevant disability related topics, family perspectives, upcoming workshops, & community events.

Personalized one-on-one assistance, care coordination, and Parent matches were provided for over 950 requests for assistance on topics ranging from service navigation, evaluation and diagnosis, school services, housing, employment, advocacy, and more.

Attendance at workshops, support groups and networking events reached over 900 people, and well over 400 community members participated in the Down syndrome Outreach Buddy Walk.

Disability awareness & acceptance presentations and technical assistance to Whatcom County school reached over 1,250 staff, students, and families in all seven school districts; topics include self-determination, inclusion and positive behavior support.

We have done this work with the support and efforts of Sponsors and funders. Their commitment to our community is vital and deeply appreciated. We're grateful for the positive impact of Buddy Walk Silver Sponsors: Coppinger Carter Law Firm and Cascade Dafo.

Sadly, we did not produce a Smiles Of Life Calendar for 2019. Our Board and staff are determined to create one for 2020. When we evaluate the impact of our programs and services, our measures are defined by how well a program contributes to our mission, how many people's lives are influenced and improved by the program, as well as the costs of offering that service. We are committed to securing sponsors and funding early in the year to move forward with the extensive work of arranging for and coordinating photo shoots, photo editing, creating profiles, and completing the graphic design work.

At The Arc of Whatcom County, we are honored to walk with individuals and families on this journey and help them navigate the complex world of developmental disabilities. We can, and will, provide a place to gather, to engage, and to re-commit to our shared aims. We look forward to collaborating on our common purpose with each of you. Common misperception

People with developmental disabilities lack the capacity to work, lead meaningful lives or have meaningful relationships. They are too vulnerable to be out in their communities. The best outcome is to be well supported within programs and services.



People with developmental disabilities face exclusion because of structural, spatial, systemic and attitude barriers. In addition to financial impoverishment, people with intellectual disabilities often face a **poverty of experience**, which restricts their opportunities to grow and find fulfillment, as well as a **poverty of expectations**, which restricts what they can do and who they can become.
