What to do and when to do it, here are		
some activities to do by age.		
15-16	Apply for a Washington State I.D. card. (before 18 is easier) Located at 4180 Cordate Pkwy Ste. A, Bellingham, WA (360) 676-2096 WHY: A photo ID will be needed to apply for many adult services.	WASHINGTON STATE DEPARTMENT OF LICENSING
16	Apply with Developmental Disabilities Administration (DDA) WHY: Case management, family support and other services to help your son or daughter maximize their independence. Long term supports for employment after age 21. Applying early helps ensure funding availability. 360-714-5000	Washington State Department of Social & Health Services DDA Developmental Disabilities Administration
17-17 ½	Consider if guardianship is necessary and determine type of guardianship. WHY: At age 18 your son/daughter becomes a legal adult and may need support making legal, medical and vocational decisions. Consider alternatives to full guardianship. Contact the Arc, 715-0170 for resources and planning guides.	GUARDIANSHIP and alternatives
17-19	Apply for low income Housing at the Housing Authority WHY: The wait list for housing can be long, so it's important to apply early. (360) 676-6887. Learn about housing choice vouchers and project based housing.	A THE
18	If your child does not receive Social Security Benefits—apply now! WHY: He or she is now an adult and parent's income is not counted. He/she may be eligible for cash and medical benefits. There are many provisions available, called WORK INCENTIVES, that allow people with disabilities to keep benefits, including Medicare/Medicaid, while working He or she needs to pay rent to the family in order to maximize SS benefits. 18	Ask your DDA case manager about Personal Care funding. If your son or daughter needs help with bathing, grooming, dressing, laundry, etc. funding may be available for Personal Care. Support can be provided by either family members or a contracted provider. Contact your DDA case manager and ask about the "Community First Choice" (CFC) Program 360-714-5000. Apply now to see how this and other services may benefit your family.	Personal Care
Senior year	Fill out the Free Application for the Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) WHY: If seeking aid to attend college, this form must be filled out by March 1 of Senior year for best consideration. www.fafsa.ed.gov	FAFSA FIDERAL STUDENTALD
18-21	Apply for services with the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR) WHY: This agency helps people with disabilities get and keep a job, and understand how working affects benefits. 360-812-6610	DSHS Parkers Back Securing of Local Livery Division of Vocational Rehabilitation
19-20	Apply to the Job Foundations Program WHY: Connects students their second to last year of school with adult vocational agencies to ensure an effective transition to work and adult life. Must be DDA eligible. Talk with your teacher or DDA case manager.	HEALTH AND COMMUNITY SERVICES
Anytime	Apply for job search assistance with WorkSource Youth Services WHY: This is a local program that can help self-directed job seekers find part time and/or summer employment to help develop work skills.	Work Source
Anytime	Whatcom Transportation Authority and Paratransit services WHY: Learning to ride the bus helps your son or daughter to be more independent. They offer flexible alternative public transportation for people with disabilities. Ask about travel training and reduced fares. 360-676-7433





Ready, Set, KNOW...

Assistive Technology through DDA Waivers

Assistive Technology is available on all the home and community based services waivers at the Developmental Disabilities Administration. AT helps people accomplish everyday tasks and be more independent.

AT are adaptive items and assistive equipment and product systems . See DDA's rules in:

WAC 388-845-0415 and WAC 388-845-0425

Guidelines for Requesting Assistive Technology

All requests for AT must come from the person needing it and must be approved by DDA. A recommendation for the requested technology is required. Your DDA case manager can recommend basic items that meet eligibility criteria in DDA's waiver rules, while other items used for expressive and receptive communication need a more thorough recommendation from a qualified professional that you're working with, like a speech therapist.

Additionally, all AT items should be affordable and meet health, safety, and welfare standards. The requested AT must not be available through other sources, like private insurance, Medicare, Medicaid, or the Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment (EPSDT) program.

If approved for AT, make sure to get a copy of the approval in writing or email from your case manager.

Some AT items include:

- Tablets
- · Communication applications
- Switches
- Adaptive utensils to assist with eating, dressing, and writing
- Timers or electronic devices that monitor or sense movement
- Voice Activated systems
- Visual alert systems

More Resources to Learn about Assistive Technology:

Northwest Access Fund provides lowinterst loans for people to purchase assistive technology for individuals with disabilities of all types, including seniors with age-related functional limitations.

Washington Assistive Technology Act Program provides resources and services to individuals who face challenges related to disability and aging help in the selection of and use of AT.
